Pupil Premium Strategy: Bushfield School 2018-19

Reviewed annually, last review: Sept 2018

Introduction

Pupil Premium is additional funding allocated by the government for children from disadvantaged backgrounds to ensure that they can access and benefit from the same educational opportunities as the rest of their peers. This funding is to be spent by the school in ways in which they will feel will best support the raising of attainment and progress for this pupil cohort. Additionally, its use is to work towards ensuring this group reaches the same age related attainment goals as the rest of the year group. Pupil Premium funding is allocated to schools according to numbers of pupils in the school who are or have been eligible for Free School Meals. The amount of funding per child and the calculation for who is eligible is carried out by the government, who in turn informs the schools and provides the additional funding. Each year, the school allocates its expenditure of the Pupil Premium money after considering the nature of the children in school and their needs.

Principles

We ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of the pupils in the school. We also ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups and this includes looking at the needs of socially disadvantages pupils and making sure that their needs are adequately assessed and addressed. In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive Free School Meals will be socially disadvantaged and conversely not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged may be registered or qualify for Free School Meals. Consequently, the school may use this funding to support academic progress regardless of a child's academic level. As a school, we reserve the right to allocate the Pupil Premium funding to support any pupil or group of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged and underachieving. Pupil Premium funding will be allocated following consideration of priory need for classes, groups or individuals. It may be the case that finite resources means that not all children receiving Free School Meals will be in receipt of all Pupil Premium interventions at one time. The majority of the support provided through the Pupil Premium, will be aimed at improving academic progress and helping children to work towards or achieve age related expectations in English and Maths.

Provision

The range and type of provision the school may consider include:

- Smaller class sizes
- Small group work focussed on overcoming gaps in learning

- Booster groups for identified pupils
- Additional teaching and learning opportunities/assessment provided through learning mentors, teaching assistants or external agencies.
- Emotional/behavioural wellbeing and development provided through:
 - Nurture groups
 - o Learning mentors
 - Play therapy
 - o In class support
 - Other agency involvement
 - Breakfast club
 - Music workshops
- Enhanced curriculum opportunities:
 - Forest school
 - Residential trips
 - Visitors into schools
 - Day trips out
 - Enquiry based learning projects
